Start with a logic model. Pilot and test your program model with surveys, interviews, and outcome data collection. Create a program manual.

Evaluation capacity should be strong and program model well-defined. Evaluation study must [1] use a randomized or quasiexperimental (e.g., matched) design, and [2] focus on outcome topics such as child safety, child permanency, child well-being, and adult well-being. Other technical details in Handbook





Included in state prevention plan

Title IV-E agency includes program in state prevention plan and contracts for service. Agency must spend 50% of expenditures on "Well-supported" programs. Any "Supported" or "Promising" programs must include a rigorous evaluation.

Rated by clearinghouse

There are four ratings:

- 1. Well-supported: 2 studies with positive outcomes, at least 1 outcome sustained 12 months after programs ends
- 2. **Supported:** 1 study with positive outcomes, at least 1 outcome sustained 6 months after programs
- 3. **Promising:** 1 study with positive outcomes
- 4. Doesn't currently meet criteria

Submit to clearinghouse

Respond to the public calls for submissions to be reviewed by the clearinghouse. There is no official timeline. Priority is given to programs with a supporting letter from a Title IV-E agency or the Children's Bureau, and to programs listed in another clearinghouse.
